Fourth Sunday in Ordinary Time 2019—Year C

Jeremiah 1:4-5, 17-19 / 1 Cor 12:31 – 13:13 / Luke 4:21-30

Paul's exhortation to love should be understood as part of the apostle's appeal to the Corinthians (and to all believers) to live together in a harmonious union wherein the different gifts of each person are valued and respected (1 Corinthians 12-14). Paul inventoried the gifts of the Spirit and underscored the priority which love enjoys over and above all other gifts (vv. 1-3). No gift, however remarkable (e.g. tongues, prophecy, knowledge, faith, generosity to the poor, etc.) should be exercised unless it originates in and is motivated by love.

In verses 4-7, Paul gave form and character to love by describing it in personification. Notice that Paul does not say, the loving Christian does things patiently or kindly; rather, the says "love is. . .", "love does . . .", "love does not. . ." Paul would have his readers understand that by embodying love in their words and works, Christians learn to know God, albeit if only imperfectly in this life (13:9). But, unlike all the other gifts, love has a perduring quality which survives the grave and leads to full knowledge of God. . . "then I shall know even as I am known" (13:12).

By calling for an exercise of the virtues of patience, kindness, forbearance, trust and endurance, all of which are motivated by, and are an expression of love, Paul was probably referencing some of the difficulties which plagued the Corinthian church, e.g., (1) intolerance and impatience (8:1-13); (2) jealousy and rivalry (1:10-17); (3) rudeness and a lack of consideration of others (11:17-22); (4) refusal to deal with immorality and scandal (5:1-6), etc.

Because these sins and shortcomings continue to erode the shared union of believers, contemporary readers of Paul are challenged by him to accept and appropriate love as the highest and greatest of all God's gifts and to allow this gift to inspire and inform every thought, word and action whether it be singing God's praise or simply stirring-the-oatmeal.

PANAMA CITY — Serving God and his mission is not a passing thing, but can and should be pursued in the present, with one's entire life, Pope Francis said Sunday at the closing Mass

for World Youth Day in Panama City.

"Brothers and sisters, the Lord and his mission are not a 'meantime' in our life, something temporary; they are our life!" the pope said Jan. 27. "Not tomorrow but now, for wherever your treasure is, there will your heart also be."

Jesus "wants to be our treasure, because he is not a 'meantime,' an interval in life or a passing fad; he is generous love that invites us to entrust ourselves," he continued. "You, dear young people, are not the future but the now of God." At the end of the Mass, which officially closed World Youth Day 2019 in Panama, Cardinal Kevin Farrell, prefect of the Dicastery for Laity, Family, and Life, announced that the next

Discastery for Laity, Family, and Life, announced that the next international youth gathering will be in Lisbon, Portugal, in 2022.

"At the conclusion of this celebration," Pope Francis said, "I thank God for having given us the opportunity to share these days together and to experience once more this World Youth Day," adding that the "faith and joy" of the young people present "made Panama, America and the entire world shake!"

"I ask you not to let the fervor of these days grow cold. Go back to your parishes and communities, to your families and your friends, and share this experience, so that others can resonate with the strength and enthusiasm that is yours."

ADORATION

Adoration is when we go to the church and pray in front of the Blessed Sacrament. You can go any time into the church to privately pray before the tabernacle, like a private adoration. But when people speak of adoration, they usually mean going to church during the time when the parish has Adoration with Exposition scheduled. This is when the priest takes a consecrated Host out of the tabernacle and puts it in a special holder called a "monstrance" that is placed on the altar. The monstrance has a round glass window that the Host in placed in, so that it is exposed, or visible, to the people. Parishioners (or anyone, really) are encouraged to come during Adoration with Exposition. The people are "adoring," or worshipping, Christ in His Real Presence in the Eucharist. While you are there sitting quietly in the pew before the Real Presence, you can pray, read spiritual books, meditate on a mystery of the faith, ponder God's will for us, etc.

Here at St. Mary's parish, we have Adoration with Exposition every Wednesday and Thursdays between 8:30am to 9:30am before mass. Starting next Tuesday January 8th, 2018 an hour of adoration will be officially added between 9:00am to 10:00am before mass.
