St. Mary of the Annunciation Capital Campaign Q&A's

Based on feedback and questions from the distributed parishioner surveys along with town hall questions, here are a list of questions and answers related to the capital campaign. The church councils, committees and ministries are hopeful that this will provide some additional clarity related to the campaign.

- 1. Regarding the construction of the new building, why can't it just be all religious education? The documented purpose of the Living Our Mission (LOM) campaign under the direction of Father Biber was to build a separate, standalone space for the food pantry, a nursery, and meeting space. Unless we completely exclude the LOM campaign money collected, that money must be used for the purpose stated in the original campaign.
- 2. Can we put the new building on the kitchen side of the church, in the courtyard or just build a second story onto our existing parish hall space? When reviewing the option of building on the kitchen side with the Diocese Building and Architecture Review Committee (BARC) committee, it was rejected. This is due to the fact that the only way to access the back of the Hall building or back of our property is along that side of the building. There were other logistical issues such as the potential loss of parking in the circle and having to move the Stations of the cross. Adding a floor to the Hall was also investigated including a review by the Architect that we hired to develop our plans. We started with a review of the current structure and blueprints. A couple of simple issues came up immediately: the limited options for a location for an elevator to meet accessibility requirements (the location of stairs was also challenging) and the pitch of the roof when building our classrooms. Based on the requirements of the Food Pantry it couldn't be located upstairs.
- 3. If we build a food pantry to USDA standards, does that make the building a government building and does it suddenly come under the control of government regulations? The facility does need to comply with county and state regulations with regard to food preparation and storage. The church already is working closely with the county to comply with all existing regulations. The USDA approval simply provides money to offset the cost of food and does not suddenly make the building USDA or government property.
- 4. Does the price of the new building stated at the town hall include all water, electricity and excavation costs? Yes.
- 5. What if we don't agree with the items included in the capital campaign? The initial case items were identified by parish leadership along with Fr. Alex. While project priorities and feedback from the parish surveys is still being reviewed and considered, eventually a decision will be finalized on which projects will be supported by the campaign. While some parishioners may not agree with the prioritization, the hope is that they would consider supporting the campaign to build a strong and more vibrant future for the parish. At the end of the day each individual or family is free to support the campaign or not. The parish will not force anyone to support the campaign and there will be no internal pressure to make families feel like they are obligated to do anything they do not want to do. We are asking families to make a decision of faith and to pray about how they could best support their parish.
- 6. What dollar threshold must we meet for each particular item in the campaign before work can begin on that project? We do not need to wait for a certain threshold or for the completion of the five years of the campaign before beginning the construction process. Tim, from Greater Mission, advises that the Parish Council and Finance Council discuss when they would like to proceed. Typically, parishes get short-term financing from the diocese or from a local bank. Since the parish has some funds already on hand, there is a possibility that we could begin the first phase of construction within the next 12 months. More communication would be provided if we chose this route.
- 7. What if we go over the amount requested? Greater Mission will ensure that a line is devoted to the campaign document stating that any funds raised above the campaign total will be allocated to the parishes general maintenance funds to be used for maintenance projects as determined by the parish.
