

Everyone 14 years of age or older is bound to abstain from meat on Ash Wednesday, all the Fridays of Lent and Good Friday. *Everyone 18 or older, and under 59 years of age, is bound to fast on Ash Wednesday and Good Friday.

Biblical Reasons for Giving & Generosity:

Exodus 35 - THE BUILDING OF THE TABERNACLE: The Israelite people were freed from Egyptian bondage and began the journey to the Promised Land. They were told to build a place of worship, the Tabernacle. When provided the opportunity to give, these former slaves gave so freely and abundantly that they were eventually asked to stop giving. They had completely met the needs for their place of worship.

I Chronicles 29- THE BUILDING OF THE TEMPLE: King David began preparing for this magnificent building that his son, Solomon, would actually construct. Beginning with his own sacrificial gift and challenging the leaders and people to give, he raised a great sum of money to provide for this temple.

Acts 4 - EARLY CHURCH EXPERIENCES THE SPIRIT OF GENEROSITY: At Pentecost, a spirit of generosity swept through the church to such an extent that it was reported in Acts 4 that "no one claimed private ownership of any possessions." Barnabas personified the spirit of giving by donating his personal property and giving the receipts to the church in order to meet the needs of other Christians. II Corinthians 8-9 - A SPECIAL OFFERING FOR JERU-SALEM CHRISTIANS: Paul instructed the first known donor consultant, Titus, to lead the Corinthian church in a giving campaign for the poverty-stricken Christians in Jerusalem. Using the example of the Macedonian Christians, these members of the Corinthian church were challenged to give joyfully and intentionally.

I pray that we the parishioners prayerfully consider supporting the parish capital campaign to pay off the roof that was replaced, expansion of our meeting space for fellowship and classrooms for religious education, renovation of bathrooms in the narthex, expansion of the food pantry to serve the poor among other parish renovation needs.

STEWARDSHIP REFLECTION

"It is written: 'The Lord, your God, shall you worship and him alone shall you serve." MATTHEW 4:10

Tempted between the riches and power of this world and service to God, Jesus chose service to His Father. If we wish to truly follow Jesus, we, too, must decide to turn away from worldly power and riches and put God at the center of our lives. As we embark on this capital campaign together, please keep in mind that many of our next steps are dependent on the pledges you make and how quickly you return them.

With this in mind, we are asking that you please return your capital campaign pledge commitments by the weekend of March 11 and 12 so we can plan for those next steps as soon as possible.

This **does not** mean you need to have all of your money in by that date, we only need YOUR PLEDGE letting us know that you plan to donate.

We will have a collection area in the narthex for you to turn in your pledges.

Your generous support will help to ensure that we take care of the needs of our parish now and well into the future.

PLEASE REMEMBER TO TAKE THE PLEDGE PACKAGE IN THE NARTHEX

Capital Campaign Q&A's:

1. Am I locked into whatever tier of donation I choose?

Pledges to the campaign can be changed at any time. We realize that your circumstances may change over time. You can increase, decrease or cancel your pledge at any time by contacting the Parish Office.

2. Can I give a different amount than what is suggested?

Absolutely, you are encouraged to pray about your pledge decision and make a pledge that is comfortable for you and your family. You can refer to the gift chart in your packet to review monthly giving amounts over a five-year period. Know whatever decision you come to, that the parish is grateful for your faithful generosity.

3. Can I give digitally, or must I write checks each month? How would that work?

You can make a decision on whether you want to give online or write a check to the parish. Online giving does allow you the option to set reoccurring contributions to fulfill your pledge and is often more convenient for many families. Donors who would like to write a check will receive a reminder notice from the parish either on a monthly, quarterly or yearly basis depending on your preference. Checks can be returned with the reminder notice, or you can simply put in the memo section of your check that it is designated to the capital campaign.

4. I am on a fixed income. Is it okay for me to reduce my weekly offering so I can give more to the capital campaign?

A weekly offertory is critical to the parish and the operational budget. We would encourage families to continue their weekly offerings to the parish. We ask that you prayerfully consider a pledge to the capital campaign that is within your budget in addition to your weekly contributions.

5. Why do you need our pledges returned so quickly? Does that mean you need all of our money turned in quickly as well?

We are encouraging families to consider making a pledge to the campaign over the next few weeks so the parish leadership team can continue advancing the construction timeline and put into place the next steps for the projects.

Your money does not need to be returned as quickly. We will be collecting the money from the campaign over the next five years. However, this does not mean construction will begin five years from now. Our goal is to begin construction once we have secured the final go ahead from the Diocese and we have selected a contractor for our project.

6. What if I don't want or have the means to support the capital campaign?

We recognize some families may not have the means or desire to support the campaign. Please pray for the success of the campaign. You can also consider volunteering to help with some of the campaign activities.
