#### DEAR PARISHIONERS,

pastor's desk through the creation of a freestanding building on our grounds, I've been reflecting on the existing structure we share as parishioners of St. Mary of the Annunciation and the spaces within, which allow us to fulfill so many different ministries: Our beautiful church sanctuary where we are nourished by the Word of God, our food pantry which services the hungry, our religious education classrooms that educate the next generation of Catholics, the conference room which hosts multiple meetings to help us conduct the business of the church, the narthex which allows us time to prepare ourselves for the reverence needed in the sanctuary where our Lord resides, and our kitchen which has provided so many wonderful meals to our faith community at our most joyful times and in times of deepest sorrow. I am grateful for the many different spaces we have available in this parish. But as I reflect on these spaces, I have some concerns that I want to share.

I have watched as some of these spaces have devolved into areas of territorial possession and of boundaries. Instead of being a place where "all are welcome," they have become a personal sphere where cliques develop and outsiders are shunned, where the resources that are meant to be enjoyed by all parishioners are jealously guarded by the few. This is not aligned with the spirit of this parish. We need all parishioners to feel that the spaces within our building are welcoming and serve their intended purpose, and more importantly, that fellow parishioners are welcomed joyfully into those spaces. We should not be deciding that only some parishioners are worthy of our attention and our love and others are not. While there will always be personality conflicts, we should constantly strive to lift each other up, mend our differences, and help build a stronger community of faithful servants of Christ.

In addition, specifically regarding our kitchen space, this area has the ability to impact the health and safety of our parishioners if neglected or used improperly. We must keep this space sanitary and uncluttered so that we can avoid any legal health concerns or hazards and so that we can ensure the longevity of the equipment that occupies that space. We must clean it thoroughly after every use and ensure that any appliance that is not working properly, develops mold, or is in need of a more professional cleaning, is reported to me, our maintenance committee chairman, Jim Kuh, our parish council chairman, Jim Lepp, or our finance council chairwoman, Tina Sebak. The kitchen is a shared resource and a shared responsibility, but ultimately, I am held accountable to safeguard that area and to ensure it is being used and maintained properly. If I wish to look at the equipment in the space, or bring a person into the space to look at the condition of a piece of equipment and to make recommendations to me, it is no one's responsibility to try to prevent that from occurring or to make anyone feel uncomfortable for doing so. No one person owns or can lay claim to any of the shared resources in the kitchen. To sow seeds of division, anger, and doubt is not helpful to this parish community and is working actively against our mission and our purpose as Catholics. It undermines the spirit of unity that we are trying to build, and demonstrates to our young parishioners, and to any community members who may be visiting or contemplating becoming a Catholic, that this place is unfriendly and unwelcoming.

I do hope that you know I appreciate all who volunteer in service to our church and our community. I am deeply grateful for your passion and commitment to your ministries and to this parish that has relied on the mission spirit of its parishioners to keep it going for multiple decades.

#### THE HOLY MASS EXPLAINED

The Holy Mass could be described as the ritual celebration of what Jesus fulfilled only once in history: The Last Supper on Holy Thursday, His Death on Good Friday and His Resurrection on Easter Sunday. The celebration of the Mass can be divided into four parts:

Gathering rites

Liturgy of the Word of God

Liturgy of the Eucharist or Meal sharing

Rite of Commissioning: sending out to live our experienced in the Mass.

#### **Part Three: Liturgy of the Eucharist:**

Following the Presentation of the Gifts, which symbolize our heart & soul and our entire life in the form of bread and wine, we move to the next stage, which is the central and most important part of the Holy Mass.

#### The Eucharistic Prayer:

The long prayer forms the heart of our faith. There are four Forms of the Eucharistic prayer. Considering the time factor, we, generally use the second Form, which is the shortest, for the daily Mass and sometimes for the Sunday Mass. The other three Forms are a little longer and they are used for solemn and festive days. Even though they differ in length, all have the same structure: We call upon God to remember all the wonderful saving deeds in salvation history; We recall the central event fulfilled by Jesus Christ and in particular the memorial he left us on the night before he died. Thus, we recall his passion, death, and resurrection; and After gratefully calling to mind all the wonderful saving acts, God has done for us in the past, we petition God to continue those deeds of Christ in the present: we pray that we may become one body, one spirit in Christ. The Eucharistic prayer begins with the Preface, with a kind of dialogue between the presiding priest and the assembly. First, the priest greets the people saying, "The Lord be with you". He, then, asks the people to approach the table of the Lord with the invitation, "Lift up your hearts" and the people respond, "We lift them up to the Lord". Again, the priest asks the people to give thanks to the Lord and the people respond, "it is right and just".

The preface introduces us into the central part of the Eucharistic prayer, concluding with the joyful and enthusiastic words, "Holy, Holy, Holy Lord God …" With faith and fervor we join the Angels and Saints in praising God with these words, for the marvelous gift, He is going to give us at the Eucharistic table.

#### STEWARDSHIP REFLECTION

"For if we live, we live for the Lord, and if we die, we die for the Lord; so then, whether we live or die, we are the Lord's." – Ro-MANS 14:8

This is the essence of stewardship – everything we have and everything we are is a gift from God. We aren't "owners" of anything, we are merely "stewards" of the gifts that God has given us, especially our very own lives. Pray to God, daily, and ask Him how He is calling you to the live the life that He intended for you.
