Please bring all Palms and Blessed articles in need of disposal to church no later than February 14th. These items will be burned after the 11:00 AM Mass on the 14th to make ashes or to be buried

Because Palms have been blessed by a Priest and therefore are holy objects, the palm branches used for Catholic Church services, especially those used on Palm Sunday, should not be disposed of in the regular fashion. Once an object is blessed, it is considered to be in the service of God and should be treated with respect. Therefore, it is considered sacrilegious to throw a holy item in the garbage, where it might end up in a sewer or a landfill. Holy palms should be returned to nature. The Catholic priests take all of the collected palms and burn them. They save the ashes to use for the Ash Wednesday service. Palms are not the only objects routinely blessed by the Catholic Church. Holy water, oils, rosaries and relics also have a special religious significance. Churches typically have a special sink that runs straight into the ground where holy water, oils and blessed wine is discarded. Combustible items may be burned, everything else should be buried in an area where people are not likely to walk, such as under a tree.

Regulations for Fasting and Abstinence

Fasting is to be observed by all 18 years of age and older, who have not yet celebrated their 59th birthday. On a fast day, one full meal is allowed. Two other meals, sufficient to maintain strength, may be taken according to each one's needs, but together they should not equal another full meal. Eating between meals is not permitted, but liquids, including milk and juices, are allowed.


Abstinence is observed by all 14 years of age and older. On days of abstinence no meat is allowed. Note that when health or ability to work would be seriously affected, the law does not oblige. When in doubt concerning fast and abstinence, the parish priest should be consulted.

Ash Wednesday and Good Friday are days of fast and abstinence.

All the Fridays of Lent are days of abstinence.

Fasting, almsgiving, and prayer are the three traditional disciplines of Lent. The faithful and catechumens should undertake these practices seriously in a spirit of penance and of preparation for baptism or of renewal of baptism at Easter.

The Word Among Us daily meditations for Lent 2021 will be distributed by the Knights of Columbus after each Mass next weekend (**February 13th-14th**). Books can also be picked up in the office during regular office hours which are Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday, 9:00 AM to 1:00 PM.






WELCOME TO THE 2021 DIOCESAN APPEAL - BUILDING OUR FAMILY OF FAITH
